4 Steps to Get a Master Plumbing License



Step 1: Complete an Apprenticeship Program

- Get a high school diploma or General Educational Development (GED) certificate
- Minimum age requirements vary, but they're often between 18 and 21
- U.S. citizenship or legal authorization to work in the U.S
- Engage in the program for a minimum of 2 years
 Most plumbing apprenticeships are paid in the U.S



Step 2: Write the Journeyman Examination

- Completion of the apprenticeship program (2-5 years) prepares you for journeyman examination
- Prepare for the written test that covers topics like plumbing codes, principles, practices, materials, mathematics, and safety
- Some states may also require a practical skill test, a drug test, and a criminal background check



Step 3: Be Ready with the Necessary Documents

Ensure that you have the following documents handy at all costs:

- A valid government-issued photo ID
- Apprenticeship completion certificate
- Proof of legal residency
- Valid journeyman plumbing license
- Proof of additional experience
- Verification letters from employers detailing your on-the-job training hours



Step 4: Take the Master Plumbing Examination

- Prepare for the master plumber exam, which covers advanced plumbing topics, business management, and code knowledge
- When you get licensed, renew it regularly
- Not all U.S. states require an exam; 2-4 years as a journeyman qualifies for a master plumber license

Start gathering documents early to avoid last-minute rushes. Make copies for your records. Check with your state's licensing board for the latest specific document requirements. Ensure all documents are properly signed and certified.
